Tentative Course Syllabus
Spring 2017 Term

COURSE INSTRUCTOR

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Office Hours: Announced Weekly in class
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Course Sections: 3831, 3841, and 3843. The course will be taught and delivered the same for all sections. Further, all sections will take Exams via Canvas and ProctorU. If you are unsure what the difference is among the sections and which one you should register for, see your academic advisor.

FIN 3403 will be taught in Heavener Hall, Room 140, every Tuesday and Thursday, during Periods 3-4 (officially, 9:35-10:25 AM & 10:40-11:30 AM, but we will take only a short break between the two periods). Students are encouraged to attend the live sessions and actively participate. Seating is limited to 80 students and is on a first come, first served basis.

ACCESSING THE COURSE WEBSITE

This course is presented via the University of Florida's Canvas e-Learning course management system.

Then,

1. Log in to Canvas using your GatorLink user name and password.
2. Choose "FIN 3403: Business Finance, Spring 2017" from the list of courses.

Note that you must be registered for this course to be allowed access to the course materials. Also note that it may take 24-48 hours for Canvas to be updated with the latest enrollment data from the Registrar's Office. Therefore, if you have just added the course and are denied access, try again in 24-48 hours.

COURSE MATERIALS TO PURCHASE FROM BOOKSTORE / ONLINE

1. *Fundamentals of Corporate Finance (3rd Edition)*, Berk, DeMarzo, and Harford, Pearson, 2015.

We will be using both the textbook and the MyFinanceLab tool from Pearson. You will likely want to purchase the e-Text and MyFinanceLab bundled. Instructions from Pearson for purchasing the text and accessing MyFinanceLab will be discussed on the first day of class.

2. Calculator. You must have a financial calculator to get through the course. Many of the exam and course problems involve complex financial calculations and a financial calculator is necessary to solve them.

The ability to use a financial calculator is critical for success in this class. You are responsible for learning how to operate your financial calculator - and it is crucial that you are familiar with the financial functions of your calculator by the time we begin the time value of money chapter (Chapter 3). A calculator tutorial for the 10-BII is included on the course website.

You will not be permitted to use the calculator's User Manual to exams. You may have extra batteries (and calculator) available during the exam.

You are only permitted to use (1) a basic 4-function calculator and (2) a financial calculator during the exam. Specifically, permitted "financial calculators" includes only the HP 10b and HP 17b family of calculators, the Texas Instruments BAII

Plus family of calculators, and the Casio FC-200V financial calculator. No other financial/scientific/programmable calculators are permitted. Please plan on using one of these. No need to ask about other calculators – no other calculators are permitted.

COURSE MATERIALS WITHIN THE CANVAS CLASS WEBSITE

Note: All of the following materials are contained within Canvas. You are not required to purchase print copies of these materials.

3. PowerPoint Slides for FIN 3403. Copies of the PowerPoint slides (note shells) are highly recommended given the speed and quantity of material that we will cover during the semester. PowerPoint slides are available on the course website within each Learning Module and are also available at Target Copy Center [Phone: (352) 376-3826].
4. Old Exams and Solutions. Most students find questions and solutions from the old exams useful when studying for their own exams. They are a great source of practice problems and will give you some ideas of the kinds of questions that we could ask. However, you should understand that there is no guarantee that your examinations will be similar to those offered in the past.

Old exams and solutions for the last several years are available on the course website. I have also taken many of these exams and have sorted the questions by topic module. All of these are available on the course website. The questions/solutions sorted by topic module are also available at Target Copy Center [Phone: (352) 376-3826].
5. Solutions to End-of-Chapter Problems. The problems in the text are an excellent resource to help you study and learn the material. They are good practice before taking a graded quiz or trying to work the problems from the old exams. Answers for selected end-of-chapter problems are contained in Appendix B, but detailed solutions are not presented. Detailed solutions may be found on the course website within each Learning Module.

ASSURANCE OF LEARNING

The specific goals and objectives for FIN 3403 include the following:

Goal: Demonstrate competency in and across business disciplines.

Objective: Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of elements of finance.

Objective: Demonstrate proficiency in the use of business-related software applications.

By the end of this course:

1. You will understand the role of finance within a firm, within society, and within an economic system.
2. You will learn financial principles and terminology and gain the basic financial/mathematical tools required by managers for making financial decisions.
3. You will learn how business professionals deal with some of the legal, ethical and social responsibilities of the firm in a financial context
4. You will appreciate the role of financial leadership in a business organization.
5. You will appreciate how an understanding of finance is important to your own professional development and career success, as well as how it can impact your own, personal decisions.

I hope that by the end of this course you will have a good grasp of basic financial principles and that you will have gone beyond just memorizing facts and formulae. This will enable you to better understand current events in finance and the business world and will provide a solid framework for any subsequent courses you may take in finance.

CLASS PROCEDURES

The material for this class, along with the corresponding material on the Canvas class website, has been divided into ten learning modules. The inherent structure of an electronic platform class makes your individual study and preparation outside of class extremely important. The lecture material will focus on the major points introduced in the text. Reading the assigned chapters before class will greatly improve your understanding of the lecture. After the lecture, you should study your notes and do relevant problems from the end of chapter.

If you are an in-residence student, you are encouraged to attend the live section, no matter which section you are registered for. Moreover, despite the large size of the class, I encourage students in the live section to ask questions whenever they arise. These questions often make the class more interesting and provide benefits to the students who are unable to attend the live section.

From time to time, I may send e-mails to the entire class through the class listserv. The class listserv automatically uses your GatorLink e-mail address. Since there is limited space in your GatorLink folder, and mail is not delivered when you run out of space, you may wish to consider forwarding your GatorLink e-mail to your regular account.

E-MAIL ETIQUETTE

Please use professional e-mail etiquette, as follows:

1. Please use the fin3403.questions@warrington.ufl.edu account. This isn't to be a pain. Rather, I need to have all correspondence recorded in one place.
2. Please keep the correspondence professional. Start the e-mail with a salutation, such as "Dear Professor", or "Dear Dr. Banko", or something similar for a TA. E-mails without this may not be answered. And "Hey", or "Hey Banko", or just "Banko" is unprofessional and is not acceptable.
3. Keep the body of your message short. I don't need a lengthy explanation of the situation. Simply state what you need from me, and a short version of the facts.
4. A closing, such as "Thanks, your favorite student, Charles." Be sure to include your full name (and UF ID) somewhere, if you don't use it in the closing.

COURSE GRADES

Students will be able to access their course grades and their grades for all assignments through the Canvas Grade Book. For the Spring 2017 term, course grades will be calculated based on three exam scores, plus an extra credit opportunity, as follows:

Exams:

Three exams, each weighted 1/3 (Exam Average) which will be the Course Grade.

Format: 20 questions, with a mix of multiple choice and free response questions. Each question is worth 5 points, for a total of 100 points on each exam. All students will take the exams via Canvas with ProctorU. Time limit of 2 hours with 1 attempt per exam.

Dates: Monday, 2/6; Tuesday 3/14; and Wednesday, 4/5.

These are the traditional exams given in FIN 3403, following a similar format and style as exams given for the past several years, with one exception. Since the exams will be in Canvas, the answer format for several questions will change to free response. That is, students must type-in their answer – no multiple choice responses will be available for some questions.

Students should expect the raw exam scores to have limited adjustments in Course Grade calculations. In particular, exam grades from 80 to 100 will not likely be adjusted. Also, exam grades from 0 to 30 will not likely be adjusted.

Extra Credit:

MyFinanceLab (“MFL”) is the finance version of MyAccountingLab used in ACG2021. MFL involves completing chapter-based homework exercises designed to reinforce basic conceptions and calculations from the course. Assignments will open/close throughout the term, requiring students to maintain active involvement in the course throughout the term. There are a total of 15 assignments, one for each chapter we are covering in the book. MFL will report a score for each chapter assignment, from 0% to 100%, resulting in extra credit from each chapter between 0 (for 0%) and 1 (for 100%) point. So, a total of 15 extra credit points (“MFLEC”) can be earned.

Extra credit points will be added directly to the Exam Average from the three traditional exams. Note, however, that the extra credit points cannot increase the Course Grade above a 75 (C+).

A few examples. (1) A student scores an average of 72% on the three exams and completes MFL homework for a total of 12 extra credit points. In this case, the extra credit will increase the Course Grade to a 75%. (2) A student scores an average of 58% on the three exams and completes MFL homework for a total of 15 extra credit points. In this case, the extra credit will increase the Course Grade to a 73%.

To receive Extra Credit from MFL assignments, your e-mail address in MFL must match your “@ufl.edu” e-mail address that I see in Canvas. Otherwise, I cannot match the MFL scores to your course scores in Canvas.

Course Grade Calculation Summary:

1. Course Grade Pts = (Adjusted Exam 1 Score) x 1/3
+ (Adjusted Exam 2 Score) x 1/3
+ (Adjusted Exam 3 Score) x 1/3
2. If Course Grade Pts < 75, then
Course Grade Pts = Course Grade Pts + MIN(75 – Course Grade Pts, MFLEC)

Please note that I do not round final course scores. Therefore, a 79.9999 will not be rounded upward and will not be assigned a grade of B.

OTHER EXAMINATION DETAILS

For all students, the Exams will be computer-based exams in Canvas with ProctorU.

For the exams, you will need a calculator (and yes, you may have an extra calculator and extra batteries): please check your batteries before exams. As part of the exam, you may have access to an Exam Handout (to be determined). No other materials (not even the User's Manual for your calculator) may be used during the exam.

For all exam questions, you will receive no partial credit. This often tends to result in considerably lower scores than what would normally be observed if partial credit had been given. Thus, if you get 50% of the questions correct, this does not mean that you know only 50% of the material -- you probably know much more.

Exam 2 and Exam 3 are not cumulative. However, I may repeat a few questions from previous exams, likely questions with low pass rates.

TESTING PROCEDURES USING PROCTORU

You must pay for use of the ProctorU service. This is not optional. You can pay ProctorU directly (about \$25 per exam attempt) or you can pay using [UF ALL Access](#) – \$30 for all exam attempts in this course for the term.

In order to maintain a high standard of academic integrity and assure that the value of your University of Florida degree is not compromised, all course exams are proctored. All students will take exams electronically using the Canvas course website and ProctorU.

You will need a webcam, speakers, microphone, and a reliable Internet connection to be able to take your exams. Wireless Internet is not recommended. You may also need a mirror or other reflective surface. Google Chrome is the only supported browser for taking exams in Canvas.

[Sign up for an account with ProctorU](#) during the first week of the semester. You must sign up at least 72 hours before an exam. Failure to do so will result in additional fees. You should receive a confirmation email from ProctorU. If you experience any trouble with online registration, you should use the chat app found on every page of the ProctorU website or call [855-772-8678](tel:855-772-8678). Your instructor cannot make your appointments for you.

If you already have an account with ProctorU, simply go to:

and sign in. If you do not yet have an account, go to the same website, and then

1. Click on “Getting Started” in the top line.
2. Check the “technical specifications page”.
3. Watch the demo video.
4. Click on “Create an account”.
5. Fill in the information to create your account and click on the “Submit” button.
6. Take your picture with your webcam and upload it; alternatively, click “Skip” and the proctors will use your webcam to take your picture during your first exam session.

Once you have an account, go to:

<https://go.proctoru.com/MySchedule.asp>

and click on “New Exam” to self-schedule your exam. You may also wish to hit the “Webcam Test” button while you are on that page. You do not want to wait until the day

of the exam to test whether your equipment is working properly with the ProctorU system.

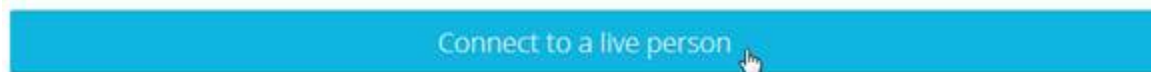
On the day and time of the exam, simply go to your account page and click on the Blue “Connect to Your Proctor” button and follow his or her instructions.

For the exams, you will need a calculator (and yes, you may bring in an extra calculator and extra batteries): please check your batteries before exams. As part of the exam, you may have access to an Exam Handout (to be determined). You will also be allowed to have 10, completely blank, pages of 8 ½” by 11” plain white typing paper (you may use graphing paper if you prefer) to use as scrap paper for doing your exam calculations. No other materials (not even the User’s Manual for your calculator) may be used during the exam.

Prior to each exam and in the same environment you plan to take the exam, go to the [ProctorU Test Page](http://www.proctoru.com/testitout/) (http://www.proctoru.com/testitout/) to ensure your computer is ready for online proctoring. After you get the 6 checks that your system is ready:



It is strongly recommended that you take the extra step to connect to a live person:



This process takes just a few minutes and is completely free.

It is important that you follow the tips provided on the [Before Your Exam handout](#). These include:

1. Sign up early. You should schedule your appointment for all exams during the first week of class.
2. Check your webcam and microphone. Make sure that your equipment meets ProctorU’s technical requirements. You should note that “Tablets” are not sufficient for taking a proctored exam.
3. Get Google Chrome (works on both Windows and Mac machines). This is the only supported software within Canvas.
4. Use a wired connection (NOT WIRELESS). This is the #1 cause of problems for test takers. You may experience difficulties in the stability of your Internet connection, even with the best wireless connection. The extra load of the proctoring software will slow things down and make it difficult for images and

charts to load and to save answers to your questions. If you do not have an Ethernet cable, buy one and learn how to use it before your first exam.

5. Test your system (see ProctorU Test Page above). You should do this the day before or the day of your exam. You should also test your system (the one you plan to use) in the same environment in which you will be taking the test. You can take the extra step of connecting with a live proctor just to insure that your system is working.
6. Find a quiet, private location. Do not take the test in a coffee house, nor in a car, nor in an airplane. Take your exam at home, a library, or any place you will be uninterrupted.

In the past, students having problems during the exam failed to follow these tips for each exam.

Week **1** Sign up for ProctorU appointments

You will have several assignments in this course that use online proctoring through ProctorU. Online testing allows your instructor to leverage the capabilities of electronic testing and give you a more realistic experience. (The real world doesn't usually give you a multiple choice test and a scantron form!)

Important NOTE: To ensure academic integrity, online proctoring is a requirement for this course. By completing this assignment, you authorize the university to collect the necessary fee to cover the cost of this service. For on-campus students, this fee is \$30.00 per course using this service. For UF Online and international program students, this fee is covered through other current costs with the program, so you will see a \$0.00 charge on your account. If you do not agree to this fee, you must provide a comment on the assignment submission. You will be required to pay a per exam fee of \$24.50 directly to ProctorU.

In this assignment, you are being asked to "opt-in" for proctoring fees. This means that you are choosing to pay the lower rate that the university has negotiated. If you do not authorize the charges, you can choose to purchase proctoring directly from ProctorU. **If you do not use proctoring, you will fail the course since you will be unable to complete the course assignments.**

In order to prevent late charge fees, you should sign up for all appointments early in the semester. When you have scheduled all your appointments, use this assignment submission form to post a screenshot of your appointment verification page.

MAKE-UP EXAMS

Make-up exams will be offered for unexpected situations that prevent you from taking the exam. Documentation must be provided from an independent 3rd party with the relevant credentials. Valid excuses include, for example, (1) medically unable to take the exam with valid documentation from a doctor, where the doctor was seen immediately prior to/after the exam date/time, (2) death in the family, and (3) birth of a child.

Again, documentation is required to justify your absence from any exam. A note indicating that you were seen at the health center the day of the exam is not sufficient documentation. The note must say that you were medically unable to take the exam. Excuses will be granted if you are unable to take the exam because of serious illness or injury.

Also, according to UF guidelines, religious observances are also valid excuses for missing an exam. However, since those are known at the start of the term, students must report these via e-mail to the class e-mail account by Friday, January 13th at 5:00p.

Excuses will not be granted for social activities, such as ski trips, weddings, cruises, birthday parties, trips to sporting events, or family vacations. Further, since the exams are administered via Canvas, exams can be taken almost worldwide. Plan accordingly.

The Exams are on Monday, 2/6; Tuesday 3/14; and Wednesday, 4/5. Check your calendar now! If you know that you have a conflict and will not be able to take one of the exams (and need to as part of your course grade), DROP THE COURSE NOW!

INCOMPLETES

State guidelines require that you must have completed substantially all of the assignments and be passing the course to qualify for an incomplete.

A grade of Incomplete will be offered only at the request of the University Ombuds, the Office of the Dean of Students, or your academic advisor.

DEADLINES

All MyFinanceLab deadlines are clearly listed for each assignment, both in MFL and on page 16 of this syllabus. There is sufficient lead-time to accomplish each assignment. All of the assignments are open for about two weeks. Please note that if you unable to complete/submit an assignment because of personal or technical difficulties, you cannot appeal the score. Further, assignments will not be open after the closing date unless a system-wide problem affected the entire MyFinanceLab system for the entire period the assignment was available. That has never happened.

APPEALS

If you have an issue with a question in MyFinanceLab, you must contact Pearson. If Pearson agrees that a question has an error, credit will then be given. The questions in

MyFinanceLab have been used now for about 5 years. It is unlikely that any question does have an error. Still, feel free to pursue this if you feel there is an error.

For the Exams, if you believe that an actual exam question has an error, then contact me by sending an e-mail to:

Include the following information: (a) your name, (b) your UFID, (c) which assignment you are referring to, (d) why you believe that the question/answer is in error, and (e) the correct answer. The e-mail subject needs to be "Exam Question Appeal."

Please follow this format. It will ensure that your question/concern is handled correctly and in a timely manner. All such appeals must be made within 24 hours of completing the exam. If a question has an error, credit for the question will be given to all affected students. No additional consideration will be offered.

STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

Students requesting classroom accommodations for their disability, including changes to the testing environment, must first register with the Disability Resource Center (DRC). You should follow all instructions as provided by the DRC. Please note that the DRC requires a 7-10 day lead-time to process your request for accommodations.

Since you will be taking your exams through ProctorU, you should obtain a digital letter from the DRC that can be e-mailed to me, and which spells out the conditions for your testing accommodations, such as the total amount of time you will require for each exam. We will then inform ProctorU of these accommodations and update the exam parameters in Canvas.

I must receive accommodation letters / DRC requests 2 full business days prior to the exam date. For example, if the exam is on Monday, I must receive all DRC requests by Wednesday evening of the week before the exam (Thursday and Friday being the two full business days). Otherwise, I do not have the lead time needed to setup the exam.

The Exam is setup to allow start times from 4p – 7:30p. If your accommodations include additional exam time, you must arrange a start time from 4p – 5p. Call ProctorU if the online reservation system will not allow this. Further, exams taken at the DRC will be proctored differently. Discuss testing options at the DRC with the testing coordinator at the DRC office. In that case, you will not need a ProctorU appointment.

COPING WITH STRESS

The following is partially excerpted from a memo sent out to the faculty by the Dean of

Students:

ACADEMIC HONESTY

The University of Florida Policy on Course Syllabi requires a section on academic honesty to be included in all syllabi:

The Academic Honesty Guidelines at the University of Florida are designed to develop and engender a community of honor, trust and respect. The academic community of students and faculty at the University of Florida strives to develop, sustain and protect an environment of honesty, trust and respect. Students within the system receive the benefits of the academic pursuit of knowledge, free from the obstacles of lying, cheating and stealing. In return, the Academic Honesty Guidelines demand that students act with integrity in all of their endeavors. Exhibiting honesty in academic pursuits and reporting violations of the Academic Honesty Guidelines will encourage others to also act with integrity. Every student who approaches their studies with honesty and forthrightness suffers when another student attains an unfair advantage by cheating.

An academic honesty offense is defined as the act of lying, cheating, or stealing academic information so that one gains academic advantage. As a University of Florida student, one is expected to neither commit nor assist another in committing an academic honesty violation.

Cheating: The improper taking or tendering of any information or material which shall be used to determine academic credit. Taking of information includes, but is not limited to, copying graded homework assignments from another student; working together with another individual(s) on a take-home test or homework when not specifically permitted by the teacher; looking or attempting to look at another student's paper during an examination; looking or attempting to look at text or notes during an examination when not permitted. Tendering of information includes, but is not limited to, giving your work to another student to be used or copied; giving someone answers to exam questions either when the exam is being given or after taking an exam; giving or selling a term paper or other written materials to another student; sharing information on a graded assignment.

MyFinanceLab assignments are designed to reinforce the course material. Given the resources available within MyFinanceLab (a complete example and links to textbook pages), students may not collaborate on these assignments. Students must complete these assignments individually. Students may not receive any assistance or aids in completing these. I am aware that some firms sell spreadsheets that “solve” the problems for you. These are not permitted. Students may not receive direct help from any tutor (including the class TAs) for completing these assignments. If you are uncertain about the parameters of this, please e-mail me.

Plagiarism: The attempt to represent the work of another as the product of one's own thought, whether the other's work is published or unpublished, or simply the work of a fellow student. Plagiarism includes, but is not limited to, quoting oral or written materials without citation on an exam, term paper, homework, or other written materials or oral presentations for an academic requirement; submitting a paper which was purchased from a term paper service as your own work; submitting anyone else's paper as your own work.

Bribery: The offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting any materials, items or services of value to gain academic advantage for yourself or another.

Misrepresentation: Any act or omission with intent to deceive a teacher for academic advantage. Misrepresentation includes using computer programs generated by another and handing it in as your own work unless expressly allowed by the teacher; lying to a teacher to increase your grade; lying or misrepresenting facts when confronted with an allegation of academic honesty.

Please note that Canvas maintains transaction logs, including the dates you log in and what you do while you are logged in. At the end of a prior term a number of students made allegations that a mistake must have been made because they “knew” that they had submitted certain assignments, but had never received credit for them, or that they had not been able to access the system on a certain day. A search of the transaction logs, which the students had not known about, indicated that they were not being entirely “truthful” in their allegations.

Although it can be done, researching the transaction logs and other data available to us does take a significant amount of time and effort. In the future, allegations that turn out not to be supported by the data will be considered an act of misrepresentation (see above) and the case will be turned over to the Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution.

Conspiracy: The planning or acting with one or more persons to commit any form of academic dishonesty.

Fabrication: The use of invented or fabricated information, or the falsification of research

or other findings with the intent to deceive for academic or professional advantage.

MyFinanceLab SCHEDULE
