

Warrington College of Business Honors Thesis Requirements for Economics (BSBA-ES) Majors

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

To graduate with honors, Warrington College of Business Economics (BSBA-ES) majors must earn the specified GPA for their catalog year in **ALL THREE** of the following areas: 1) overall UF GPA, 2) business core GPA, and 3) major GPA. In addition, students who wish to graduate magna or summa cum laude must write an honors thesis (see guidelines below). To be eligible to enroll in an honors thesis course, you must complete 90 credit hours and have the GPAs required for the magna cum laude designation. Note: University Scholars Program research papers can be used to fulfill the honors thesis requirement.

THESIS REQUIREMENTS

To graduate with the magna or summa cum laude honors designation, economic majors must use regression analysis to test various hypotheses based on economic theory about the determinants of some phenomenon. In addition, once a preliminary topic is decided upon, students should develop hypotheses they wish to test and then ascertain whether the project is feasible; that is, are the data that are required to test the key hypotheses available? Next, researchers should determine which data they will use to test their hypotheses, gather the data, and then run the regression analyses to test their hypotheses. The honors thesis, which is a formal research paper, will describe the phenomenon being studied and why it is of interest, develop the hypotheses being tested, indicate how the data were gathered and manipulated, describe in detail whether each hypothesis is supported by the statistical results, and summarize in the conclusion what has been learned from the analysis.

Completing an honors thesis is a strenuous task, and students are strongly encouraged to devote two semesters to completing their honors thesis. The department also recommends that students take Empirical Research in Economics (ECO 4935), as the empirical paper required for this fall course can be developed into a thesis in the spring under the supervision of the course's instructor. Another useful course for honors thesis candidates is Public Choice (ECO 3532), which assigns a number of empirical articles to read, develops some regression skills, and requires a paper that generally involves regression analysis. There are unlimited research topics, and students are encouraged to explore their own interests. In general, an honors thesis must be supervised by a faculty member who has an understanding of the subject you plan to research. In addition to securing a faculty advisor, students must obtain departmental approval for their project from the economics department in 224 Matherly Hall via the attached Undergraduate Honors Thesis Application. If your project is approved and you have not taken ECO 4935, the economics department will register you for ECO 4970, a one credit honors thesis course which is taken for a Satisfactory (S) or Unsatisfactory (U) grade. You are expected to enroll in this course by the end of the drop/add period. [Note that up to four additional free elective credits can be earned by taking ECO 4905 (Individual Work). The approval form to take this course can be obtained from the economics department office.] The faculty supervisor is responsible for determining if a student's thesis is satisfactory and for notifying the Honors Coordinator of the final grade. The Honors Coordinator will submit final grades.

THESIS SUBMISSION

When you finish your thesis and it is approved by your faculty supervisor, you must submit two copies to the Honors Coordinator by the Monday before the last day of classes. One copy will be maintained in the department, and one copy will be sent to the Undergraduate Program Office (who will forward it to the UF Honors Office). A typed Honors Thesis Submission Form (<http://www.honors.ufl.edu/forms/thesis.pdf>) must be attached to the front of your thesis (**handwritten forms are not accepted**). On this form, you must include an abstract of your research project (for abstract guidelines, see <http://www.honors.ufl.edu/upperdivisionhonors.html>). Your thesis should be secured with a binder clip; do not staple it or place it in a binder or folder. If you have questions about your honors thesis, contact your Honors Coordinator:
