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## GENERAL FACULTY MEETING April 17, 1992 MINUTES

The meeting was called to order by Andy McCollough at 2:10 p.m. he announced that Dean Kraft is absent due to an out of town meeting.

1. MINUTES

The minutes of the March 27, 1992, General Faculty meeting were approved as distributed.

2. ELECTION RESULTS

Dr. McCollough gave the ballot results for the following Committees:

- FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE (new members elected): Joel Cohen, Joel Houston, Tracy Lewis, and John Simmons.
- PROMOTION AND TENURE COMMITTEE (new members appointed/elected): David Sappington and Harold Benson.
- RESEARCH COMMITTEE (new members appointed/elected): Robert Knechel, Harold Benson, and Mark Rush.
- SABBATICAL EVALUATION COMMITTEE (new member elected as Chairman of Committee): Sandy Berg
- UNIVERSITY SENATE (new members elected) Tarek Amer, John Hall, Bill Bomberger, and Ginny Maurer

At this time, Dr. McCollough gave a few other announcements: Three of our faculty who have been awarded Distinguished Service Faculty status by the University Personnel Board are John Simmons, Dave Denslow, and Jack Faricy; he pointed out that there were a total of 8 awarded this year; 3 of those came from this College. In addition, three faculty have been designated Teacher of the Year for the College; John Lynch, Joel Houston and Chris Zappe. He encouraged everyone to congratulate these faculty.

Dr. McCollough briefly discussed summer support stating that most of the deliberations had been completed. Public notice should be out by the following week on the Summer Research Awards; Course Development Awards; Center Support; and Program Support. Dr. McCollough briefly commented on Summer A/B budget and the budget situation in general.

3. UNDERGRADUATE COMMITTEE

- a) The Dean's Seminar: Dr. Nye presented a description of the Dean's Seminar showing the various dates, topics, instructors and a survey given to the students. A motion was made, seconded and passed to approve the course.

b) Certificate in Global Business Studies: Dr. Nye stated that Roy Crum made changes based on the last meeting when this came to the faculty as an informational item. Much discussion took place. A motion was made, and seconded. A vote was taken with 13 no and 12 yes to approve the certificate. Based on the vote the Certificate was not approved at this time. Dr. McCollough asked that the faculty provide specific concerns or changes regarding the Certificate to the appropriate representative so that all of the faculty have the opportunity to voice their opinion before this item is brought back for action.

c) Curriculum Changes: Dr. Nye stated that the UG Committee would like for the faculty to approve - addition of FIN 3408 as the prerequisite for REE 3043, Real Estate Analysis; and addition of GEB 2931 - Dean's Seminar as an elective course. A motion was made, seconded and passed to approve these changes.

d) Report to the Faculty on the Undergraduate Curriculum - Dr. Nye reminded the faculty that at the last faculty meeting this report was discussed and the faculty suggested changes to be made to it. The report is being provided again with the suggested changes to gather more feedback from the faculty before being voted on. Dr. Nye mentioned that the UG Committee would like to bring this back for action hopefully in the early Fall semester. Much discussion took place. Dr. McCollough asked that the faculty keep in mind the following:

1) Plan A

- a minimum number (x) of courses that would be taken in the College by CBA students.
- all other courses required to meet hours needed for graduation would be taken outside the College.
- No specification as to these latter courses.

2) Plan B

- a certain number of courses (x) that would be taken in the College by CBA students.
- all other courses required to meet hours for graduation could be taken in or out of the College.
- some of the latter courses would have to be taken in International Studies and some, in Communication Skills.

Dr. McCollough encouraged the faculty to consider these and other possible alternatives so that effective change could be undertaken in the coming year.

4. Other Business - there were no other business items reported.

A motion was made to adjourn the General Faculty meeting at 3:45 p.m.

A course in advanced composition concerned with the writing of argument and critical analysis. (C)

5. **ENC 4260 - Advanced Professional Writing.** Credits: 3; Prereq: ENC 2213, ENC 3250, or instructor's permission.

This course will focus on administrative communication, professional papers, research reports, proposals, and other major professional documents depending on the needs of the students, who must have developed communication skills. (C)
